## **CO-PRESIDENTS MESSAGE**

The first meeting of the 2013-14 year was very inspirational! Our presenter was Alicia Hetman, President of AAUW-CA, who spoke to us about "The Big Picture" of AAUW. While her amazing story of becoming involved with AAUW led her to her current level of involvement, it was the beginning of AAUW that made us sit up and take notice. Seventeen women in Boston, in 1881, who were enrolled in college, could not use the college library except in the off hours, because men had the priority. These ladies banded together to form The Association of Collegiate Alumnae – the beginning of AAUW. In 1885, The Association issued its first research report. The report, *Health Statistics of Women College Graduates*, established that, contrary to popular belief, women's health was not adversely affected by attending college. We heard that in 1920, AAUW raised \$100,000 to help Marie Curie purchase the radium needed to continue her research. Alicia highly recommended that our Book Group read Lilly Ledbetter's book, "Grace and Grit." Lilly Ledbetter's case of pay discrimination ultimately resulted in The Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, which was first bill that President Obama signed into law. Alicia spoke with passion about AAUW and encouraged us to keep asking ourselves what we can do to contribute to our community. Thank you to Jan Potter for bringing her to us!

Here is some other news to report:

We have made a good beginning towards making our fund-raising goals thanks to everyone who
included their donations with their membership renewals. Our membership is at 75.

 With appreciation for Kym Pipkin's determined research, we have the approval from the Department of Justice to conduct raffles this year. Our first official raffle was held at the September meeting, thanks to Kathy Zacher.

# **AAUW FUNDS**

Thanks to additional contributions from our members and a successful raffle at the September general meeting, we reached our goal for AAUW funds and gave some extra to Tech Trek! Many thanks to all who participated and to Kym who filed the paperwork with the State so we could have legal raffles at future meetings this year for Girls State and Tech Trek as needed. Due to Petra's closing for a month, we will not have the wine/dinner fundraiser in October. Two more AAUW funds that are part of our mission:

**4339-- The Leadership Programs Fund** supports programs that develop women's potential to lead in their schools, communities, and country. This Fund supports all the following tax-deductible programs:

- National Conference for College Women Student Leaders. Attendees develop their leadership skills, networks, and ambition at this acclaimed, intensive week long conference held annually in Washington, D.C.
- Campus Action Projects. AAUW awards grants to campus leaders to deliver programs guided by the findings and recommendations of AAUW research to address a gender-based issue in their community. Replicable or ongoing projects are selected to provide continued leadership training and support for women leaders.
- Elect Her teaches leaders the skills they need to run for student government. This program
  successfully increases the number of women who are involved in making decisions that affect all
  students on campus. These student leaders are also introduced to a national network of women
  who are running for and holding public offices.

**3999—The Legal Advocacy Fund** supports the protection of the legal rights of those who are facing discrimination. Some of LAD's programs include:

- Case Support. Protects LAF plaintiffs by supporting workplace sex discrimination cases.
- Travel and Education Grants. Protects AAUW members through educational programs about legal rights delivered by LAF plaintiffs and lawyers.
- Campus Outreach Projects. Protects college students from discrimination, harassment and assault through on-campus program grants.

There have been several instances of both professors and students in California universities whose cases have been or are currently supported by LAF.
