iFoster was launched to help the 3.3 million children living in foster and kinship care who, without proper support, grow up to be homeless, incarcerated, uneducated, and too often young parents themselves. Launched in October 2010, the iFoster community is supporting over 1.8 million children across 50 states, and is growing by over 100,000 monthly.

FROM THE DESK OF YOUR FINANCE OFFICER

We are approaching the end of the year with a sense of gratitude for the generosity of all of you who had contributed to our projects and a hopeful expectation that those of you who had wholeheartedly supported our goals will make your contributions sometime soon so we can achieve our collective goals. Thank you in advance.

I would like to take this opportunity to call to your attention a fact that may be causing a little confusion. AAUW National is aggressively campaigning to raise money for Tech Trek and STEM projects, among others, the same projects for which our own Branch is so eagerly appealing to your support in order to send six girls to Tech Trek Camp. Please, when you make your contributions think of your Branch first: money sent directly to AAUW National will aid in the same programs but our Branch will not receive those funds to support our goal of sending our six girls to camp. And remember that besides Tech Trek we also need funding for Scholarship and Girls State. At this moment we have a shortfall of \$ 2,075 for Tech Trek, \$940 for Scholarship, and \$115 for Girls State.

Please keep in mind when you write your checks:

- Checks for Tech Trek should be written to AAUW and in the memo line write Tech Trek.
- Checks for Girls State should be written to American Legion Auxiliary and in the memo line Girls State
- Checks for **Scholarship** or **General Fund** should be written to North Tahoe AAUW and in the memo line indicate Scholarship or General Fund.
