Tech Trek Alumni

Two former North Tahoe AAUW Tech Trek campers gained recognition this year: Kea Jolicoeur, a 2005 camper, and Roxana Cabrera, a 2006 camper. Kia was Assistant Director at the Stanford Tech Trek camp this summer after graduating last year from Cal State University San Luis Obispo in Mechanical Engineering. Last winter, Kea was the subject of the opening article in National AAUW's magazine Outlook. Roxana graduated from UC Davis in Neurobiology, Physiology and Behavior, and is studying for the MCAT to apply to medical school. She attended a 6-week UCD medical internship in Oaxaca, Mexico last fall. This past spring Roxana was keynote speaker at our NT AAUW inter-branch tea and spoke about Tech Trek's impact on her life.

Girls State

The American Legion Auxiliary is the proud supporter of the Girls State program. In 1940, the dream of California Girls State became a reality. It saw 125 girls in attendance, at \$15 fee per girl and a \$500 working budget for the entire week. It has moved many times (even at our own Squaw Valley from 1971-74), been in recess during the war years 1942-45, been brought low by the Asian Flu in 1957, and finally in the 1980's limited to 540 girls to ensure a quality program. Currently, the session uses the Claremont-McKenna Campus and costs \$400 per girl. Our candidate for this experience was Ella Barzel. She is a senior this year at North Tahoe High School.

Volunteers from the ALA staff the sessions that take place in all 50 states. They provide a valuable learning ground in citizenship and the processes of city and state government. They come away with a deeper understanding of government operations, less intimidated by government, able to see it for what it should be ordinary people working for the good of society.

Thank you all for your contributions to the lives of these young women.
