GENERAL MEETING

We encourage you to bring spouses, friends and any family members to our programs.

We look forward to the **November 9**th presentation by an independent artist teaching in the Tahoe-Truckee Schools, **Cathee Van Rossem St. Clair**, at the Fairway Community Center (330 Fairway Drive, Tahoe City) beginning at 1 pm. We will learn how Cathee cultivates Mindfulness, Empathy and Compassion in our schools through Egg Painting. Our own Terry Yaqura, founder of Arts For The Schools, saw Cathee's work in 1987 and asked her to create a week-long workshop for children. As Terry says "It's not easy painting a story on a curving surface, in all directions, but they give 100 percent. Cathee draws them out in her wonderful way. They have to be quiet and focused and they are." Cathee uses storytelling, art and poetry to amazing ends. She maintains that language in art begins with a sensation, a straight line, a circle, a shape. Add a few quirky musings, vivid dreams, accidental epiphanies, and a few marks on canvas or stone or eggshell become visual stories that call attention to a moment in time.

One of Cathee's favorite quotes about The Egg Painting Compassion Project came from a student who completed this program many years ago:

"Eggs are perfect to paint on when you are learning about things that can break. When you know that something is really fragile, you take care of it. When you see that the whole earth and everything in it can be fragile ~ well, you can imagine how that makes you feel. Maybe if we cared for each other and the earth with our whole hearts, we would be happy, and we could relax and enjoy it together."

The Center is located at 330 Fairway Drive in Tahoe City. From route 28 in downtown Tahoe City, make a right turn onto Grove St. Follow Grove St. up the hill, past the elementary school and turn left onto Fairway

Drive. Follow this to the end and the Center will be on your left with a parking lot in front.
