They showed us several completed projects and told of plans for over <u>50 restoration projects</u> to improve the vital functions of the watershed.

Mary Koons, a new member this year, contributed to our understanding of this system with cards that display a quilt Mary crafted to hang on the wall at the council's Truckee offices. We're also proud that another new member, **Courtney Hart**, serves on the council's board.



The Story of Mary's Quilt

Mary Koons' connection with the Truckee River Watershed Council began in 2013 when she volunteered as a "<u>weed warrior</u>" to remove salsify from her neighborhood and golf course.

While attending a <u>river talk</u> that Fall, she had difficulty visualizing the entire watershed from the small maps that had to be pieced together. The Truckee river watershed is unique because the river ends in Pyramid Lake and doesn't reach the sea.

Mary's love of rivers and maps, combined with her love of textiles and sewing talent (starting at the age of 8), inspired her to create a <u>quilt map</u> of the river watershed. Her design was the culmination of research from 4 different maps and many online illustrations, as well as visits to the reservoirs on the river and to Pyramid Lake.

Her special quilt hangs in the office of TRWC and is used during river talks to show the CA watershed's relationship to the entire watershed. It also serves as a remarkable conversation starter for visitors. Mary encourages us to stop by the TRWC office in Truckee to take a look at the quilt.

And, you may ask, why do I want to hear about this program? Could it be because of its expansion in 2012 on a campus in <u>Kings Beach</u>?

Today, **Aim High** is the largest summer academic program in the Bay Area with a 2016 enrollment exceeding 2000 students. All in all, led by <u>Alec Lee</u> and <u>Eleanor McBride</u>, nearly **10,000 students** have been served since **1986** and some of them are our own Tahoe/Truckee area students!



Aim High has received awards from John Hopkins University, Bank of America's Neighborhood Builders program, the San Francisco Foundation and the National Partnership for Educational Access. Co-founder <u>Alec Lee</u> was awarded the <u>White House</u> <u>Champions of Change for distinguished service to the</u> field of summer learning in 2016.

AAUW Tahoe Nevada Inter-branch Meeting- April 18

Several members attended the Inter-branch dinner hosted by AAUW Tahoe Nevada in Incline Village: Diane Buckman, Christine Madden, Kathie Julian, Terry Yagura and Meri McEneny with guest <u>Katie</u> <u>Obrien</u> (STEM coordinator for Boys & Girls Club NLT).


Program Topic- **STEM Education** Speakers:

- Dr. Georgia White- Director of Career and Technical Education at Western Nevada College (WNC)
- Emily Howarth (M.S.)- Manufacturing professor at WNC

The focus of the evening was on preparing girls for careers in STEM fields. In addition, information was

given about programs offered by AAUW affiliates to help young girls become interested in STEM.

Dr. **Georgia White** began the program with a presentation on "Drivers", <u>driving forces</u> at the root cause for low numbers of girls in STEM classes. Her information was taken from <u>Cracking the Code: Girls'</u> <u>and women's education in STEM</u> (published in 2017 by the United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization).



Four main drivers:

- The Learner: A big driver is self-efficacy, the learner's belief in her ability to succeed in specific situations or to accomplish a task. One belief that many of us have heard is that girls aren't good in math. <u>Self-assurance</u> is vital for success and <u>confidence</u> often comes with trial and error, which girls may not experience as much as boys, through the games they play or help at home.
- Parents and Peers' beliefs and expectations may affect a girl's success or even her exposure to STEM. Parents' education and socio-economic status affect a girl's exposure to STEM; more educated and higher earning parents often encourage their daughters in STEM. Inviting parents to STEM events can increase their support for their daughters. Peers influence girls who want a feeling of belonging.
- Schools influence girls' involvement in STEM with the availability of learning materials and activities and by promoting <u>critical thinking</u>. <u>Teachers</u> can highly influence girls in STEM as <u>role models</u> and to debunk stereotypes.
- Society, especially mass and social media, can reinforce stereotypes and promote a negative influence on choosing STEM classes. But supporting gender equality and promoting

changing social norms can start to counter those effects.


Emily Howarth is the manufacturing professor at WNC and her lab looks like a ton of fun. Her <u>Mechatronics lab</u> is supported by Siemens Corporation and her students, including many women, are working in a dozen or more Nevada Tech companies. The lab focuses on <u>Manufacturing</u> <u>Technicians</u>, the layer between Engineers and Maintenance. The program offers 3 levels of certification: job skill classes (a few weeks to a few months), a <u>1-year technician certificate</u>, and a <u>2-year</u> <u>AAS</u> (Associate of Applied Science) <u>degree</u>. Tours of the manufacturing lab are available for all ages and backgrounds.

After the eye-opening and inspiring presentations, a couple of Tahoe Nevada members talked about their efforts to create a STEM event like Tech Trek or joining the similar program at UNR, but neither have received support so far.

When the discussion was opened to the floor, **Meri McEneny** discussed our branch's long involvement with **Tech Trek**, our 100th camper last year, and our new **STEM Trek Day** event. Several questions came up regarding STEM day, such as cost. Meri encouraged the large and accomplished Tahoe Nevada branch to find members, friends, family or community members to create their own STEM event. Some asked if they can attend our STEM Trek day and Meri will send Jane Dykstra, their Programs chair, the flyer.

I am Lake Tahoe native, having been born at home at my family's home in South Lake Tahoe. I have traveled all over the world and have never seen anything as beautiful as Lake Tahoe. I emigrated from South to North in 1974 and have never regretted it. I still have a brother and sister in South Shore and visit them

now and then.

I had a great childhood. I learned to ski when I was two. In 1952, the snow was up to the eave's edge of our two-story house. My sister and brother took me up to the peak of the roof, put tiny wooden skis on me and I got to zoom down to the snow at the eave's edge.

I learned to sail as a small child in a 7'11" sailing dinghy. I would sail with my dog from Camp Richardson to Zephyr Cove. When I got to Zephyr Cove, I had to call my mother to come pick me up because the waves were too big. She would drive the pickup over and we would load up the boat and the dog and go home.

I attended High School at South Lake Tahoe High in the "New School" which of course is now the "Old School". My class was the first to attend there and we had almost 200 graduates. After high school, I began college at San Jose State. I finished my studies at UNR with a degree in English in 2002.

I made the mistake of marrying my high school sweetheart, who was drafted and sent to Vietnam. He was a medic on a helicopter picking up terribly injured and maimed soldiers and saw so many of them die. When he returned, we lived together and I thought I could make him better, but I was incorrect on that. He left me right after my first son, Caleb was born and there I was, a single Mom. I moved to Hawaii to live in the yard of a friend on the North Shore of Oahu. I got there just in time to see the Big Waves and they were absolutely huge, 40 and 50 ft high crashing on the shore. They did not surf those in 1974 but I am sure they do now. Caleb and I spent about 8 months in Hawaii, he learned to swim and walk long distances in sand. I came back to Tahoe because I missed the seasons. Hawaii is nice nearly all the time unless there is a hurricane but I really like the defined seasons in Tahoe.

I moved to the town of Tahoma in late 1974 and rented a small cabin on 7th street. I found so much community on the North Shore, a babysitting co-op and a food co-op too! I met really nice people and made a lot of friends. I met my second and best husband, Jim Casey, in 1975 while sunbathing in the nude on a friend's back porch. I think it was love at first sight although I had a boyfriend at the time who took Caleb and me to Mexico. We had a wonderful time and also figured out we were not meant to be together. When I returned to Tahoma, I met up with Casey and we got together. He really loved Caleb. We bought our first home in Tahoe Pines for \$10K. We moved in and it was a tiny place, 320 square feet! We spent some time improving the place and I became pregnant with our child. Forrest was born at home with the help of a doctor and several doulas. We did the "LeBoyer bath", Forrest opened his eyes and looked right into his brother Caleb's eyes. It was an incredible moment in our little cabin.

The boys are now men and really good dads and good friends also. They are married and have two children each. I was amazed that both my daughter-in-laws took

my advice to space their children 4 years apart. Now I have 4 grandchildren and they are so much fun! Caleb lives here in Tahoe City and Forrest lives in Central Carmel Valley.

I worked doing bookkeeping for my husband's business, Sierra Roofing and then Sierra Sheet Metal and Roofing. My husband and I had many wonderful adventures sailing on Lake Tahoe and on the oceans. I lost him to cancer in 2013. I am so grateful to have had 40 years with him. He was my soulmate. I am retired now and live to ski, sail, and spend time with friends and family.

I joined AAUW because my friend Carol Schleicher invited me to Great Decisions and I enjoyed the discussion group. I just returned from Canada where I had a fabulous time powder skiing!
