John Henry Beyer, Ph.D. Geophysics

With a Bachelor's degree in physics and a Master's in geophysics, Dr. Beyer then earned a Ph.D. in Geophysics at the University of California, Berkeley. His research involved the development of technologies to find geothermal energy for electricity generation. This led to his management of a 50employee geophysical exploration company and subsequent consulting jobs managing geothermal exploration projects in Japan, Indonesia, and the Azores.

The more recent part of his career has been in research management <u>developing technologies to</u> <u>mitigate climate change</u>. At the California Energy Commission, he oversaw research focused on increasing efficiency and reducing emissions from electricity generation systems. Subsequently, he returned to Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory to manage research on the geologic storage of carbon dioxide—to keep this greenhouse gas from being released into the atmosphere by fossil fuel power plants, until we can stop burning coal and natural gas for electricity generation.

Like everything else, our beloved Tech Trek camp at UC Davis was cancelled this year, but we still wanted to do something special to recognize our 2020 girls, even given social restrictions and concern by AAUW-CA. Here's what we did:

Individual meetings were offered to each of our 2020 TT girls. The meetings would include: myself, one girl from 2020, and one of our 2015 Tech Trek alumnae; parents could attend too. We would each have facemasks (hand-made by Johnnie Lee), with hand sanitizer and distancing protocols in place. The meetings would be held outside in the parking lot of the (closed) UC Davis Field Station in Lake Forest, seated in a wide circle. All the parents and girls agreed to attend! The meetings were staggered over 3 days during the same week the TT camp was scheduled.

The great success of the meetings was due to the amazing girls from TT 2015! On Monday, Abby Rodriguez joined me with Siduri Dunning and later, Vallerie Laguna. Tuesday was Ashlyn McPherson meeting with Sky Myers, and on Wednesday Julia Saxe joined me with Priscila Oliveras and later Avala Warner. Mothers mostly stayed in their cars. We all wore our masks and stayed our distance. Skyler Kawecki-Muonio (2015) had also agreed to volunteer. All these young women from TT 2015 graduated cum laude this June from NTHS.

Sorry to say: no pictures. But it was great! The older girls were completely engaged with the younger ones. They offered advice about 8th grade, high school and preparing for college; they listened and encouraged the younger ones regarding classes, teachers, clubs, sports and scholarships. They told them they were smart and capable. We talked about confidence, work and volunteering. The 2015 girls shared their college majors and aspirations and asked the younger ones about theirs. It was beautiful. It's worth repeating.

One part of the event that was important to me was having the 2020 girls sit quietly by the creek and write a <u>Vertical Poem</u>. The Vertical Poem is an activity in a wonderful contemplative nature book by Joseph Cornell. They enjoyed the activity and wrote lovely poems (a couple are shared on **page 7**).

During our one-on-one meeting, I received permission from the mothers to email them links to 2 pages of STEM videos sent to us, branch coordinators, by the UCD TT camp coordinators. The links are to many great STEM videos, including a tour of the Space Station by <u>Astronaut Sunita Williams</u>.

The girls were asked to watch this video before our Zoom meeting with the keynote speaker of the last 2 TT camps: **Jayme (Poppin) Gabriel**, who has volunteered to speak with our 2020 Trekkers. Our UC Davis camp coordinators, Martha Rees and Susan Wheeler arranged for Jayme to address our "camp" online. Jayme has worked for 12 years with **Boeing Space at NASA in Huntsville, Alabama.** Her previous role with NASA was as a **payload specialist** for the **International Space Station.** Jayme grew up in Grass Valley but just missed being involved with Tech Trek. Four of our girls attended the Zoom with Jayme and two asked questions on Chat.

I asked each 2020 girl to join our branch for the annual 5-minute talk in the fall, this time talking about our one-on-one meeting. We will see if this can happen.

The beautiful blue TT 2020 camp T-shirts arrived after our individual meetings, and are all large, but the girls are happy with them just the same!

Finally, a sincere thank you to our sisters at **Tahoe League for Charity**, for their recent grant to Tech Trek and with gratitude for their on-going support.

Tahoe Truckee Community Foundation (TTCF) 2020 Report

In the midst of a global pandemic, economic upheaval, and social unrest, a committed group of donors and volunteers worked tirelessly for the **Community Scholarship Program**. During many meetings, they ensured that a careful, deliberate, and equitable process resulted in **126 Tahoe Truckee students** receiving **over \$1 million** in local scholarships. After the common software provided by the **Tahoe Truckee Community Foundation** (TTCF) identified eligible students, it was time for the humans to narrow it down. From March 31st to May 1st, committee volunteers spent countless online hours sifting through over **5,000 scholarship applications from 145 eligible students**, reading letters of recommendations, matching students to scholarships, and enduring the emotional weight of deciding who gets what. This beautiful burden is a testament to the generous and giving nature of our small, but big-hearted community.

The Tahoe Truckee Community Scholarship Program began over 30 years ago, but it was only when combining forces in 2017 through TTCF's unifying application software that the huge impact of this program across our community could be seen. In 2017, the program awarded \$264,250 in local scholarships, which quickly grew to \$1,038,000 by 2020. The result is a joint community effort that has awarded \$2,855,660 in scholarships to 453 local students since 2017. This is a gift that allows students to follow dreams they may never have thought possible, thanks to the magnanimity of scholarship donors and tireless commitment of volunteers.

The scholarship program is giving crucial support to Tahoe Truckee students of all backgrounds and interests, whether they make their way to community college, four-year universities or trade schools. What's surprising is just how often the interests of the donors and student recipients match up seamlessly. The variety of scholarships is as diverse as the recipients themselves. For every interest, intellect and ability, it seems there is a scholarship. Within this array of opportunities, reside awards which support young women, honor first generation college students, encourage the arts and sports, promote civic engagement and encourage social justice. The Community Scholarship Program is a remarkable example of the collaborative power of community giving, ensuring the best possible outcomes for students. In addition, the process ensures that awards are spread out among worthy applicants.

Fortunately, our community stepped up to the challenge, in a big way. With over \$1 million in scholarships awarded this year alone, the Community Scholarship Program is supporting local students achieving their dreams through collective generosity. At TTCF, we are so grateful to work with the countless volunteers and generous donors who make up this powerful program. There is a deep well of generosity in our community. A great debt is owed to everyone who took the time and energy this year, during a pandemic to advocate for these students. If ever there was a reason for hope in the future, these students have certainly underscored it. These scholarships and the people and groups, who make them possible, represent the best of this vibrant and diverse community we call home, a community we are proud to support at the Tahoe Truckee Community Foundation.
