

CO-PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

We all hope for a healthier, calmer 2021, for ourselves and the greater world. Nine months into the pandemic, a sense of community is more valued than ever. We missed those of you who weren't able to join us for our holiday party—we had such a good time! We will continue doing Zoom meetings until it's once again safe to meet in person—so please join us!

Which brings us to our next opportunity, which is a weighty subject that you might think isn't pertinent to our members. January 11, 2021 is National Human Trafficking Awareness Day.

AAUW California supports efforts to combat Human Trafficking, as noted in our Public Policy Priorities: "Freedom from violence and fear of violence, including ...human trafficking...in homes, schools, workplaces and communities..." California had the highest number of reported cases of human trafficking in 2019 in the United States. Unfortunately, this IS an issue in our area, from South Shore to Truckee, even including Crystal Bay.

Human Trafficking is the third largest organized criminal activity in the world. Human Trafficking is a modern-day form of slavery, with an estimated number of victims in the millions. Whether for labor or sex, men, women, and

children are manipulated through force, fraud and coercion.

Research shows that people of color, especially the Black community, are more likely to experience some form of sex trafficking. Racial and economic biases drive both social and legal presumptions of "victims" having chosen their situation.

Law enforcement efforts against human trafficking are stronger today than in 2017, but still inadequate. Globally, definitions of human trafficking vary from country to country. Even using the term "slavery" is met with opposition in cases of forced marriages and cross border smuggling.

In California, legislation in the past few years includes support for victims, updating school health curriculum, and addressing hospitality industry training. But legislation is not the key unless the public is educated as to the enormity of the issues, both locally and globally. Local branches of AAUW continue to provide community awareness events to educate the public. Please join us on January 14, 2021 at 10:30 am for our meeting to learn more, and to start the year off amongst friends.

On Dec 13, the AAUW Orinda-Moraga-Lafayette (OML) branch continued their impressive **Girls4STEM webinar series**, aimed specifically for Tech Trekkers still in high school, with "My Career from the Lab to Launching New Consumer Products", by **Deborah Martin**, MPH/CIH, Global Manager, Product Stewardship & Regulatory, Dupont Nutrition and Biosciences.



Ms. Martin discussed her winding career path and little-known fields like Environmental Health Services. She talked about the difference between working in a lab and using

lab work in other capacities such as Regulations. She urged career and life balance (she is a wife and mother of two teenagers, and loves the outdoors), although at times work can be all-consuming. She stressed that your college choice is important, but that it is *What makes you, you?* and your personal attributes such as being prepared and having curiosity that better predict your desirability in the workplace. Her talk was engaging and eye-opening.

In other Tech Trek news, branch coordinators throughout the State gathered on Zoom to learn about likely plans for a **Virtual Tech Trek in 2021**. The Virtual camp would be offered three different weeks during the summer (**June**, **July** & **August**), on a Zoom platform.

The Core morning class would be <u>Robotics</u>, 9amnoon, M-F, sponsored and supported by Qualcomm. Camp director <u>Mary Isaac</u>, known as *Dr. Mimi*, hosted a similar virtual camp this summer with her San Diego branch TT girls. Several of these girls attended our Zoom meeting and testified to the fun and interest of the virtual Robotics camp.

Each lunchtime would offer an Inspirational Speaker. Afternoon classes would follow the STEM format: <u>Mon</u>.: **Science**, <u>Tue</u>.: **Technology**, <u>Wed</u>: **Engineering**, <u>Thu</u>.: **Math**, and <u>Fri</u>.: girls showcase their **Robotics** projects.

The Virtual 2021 camp would provide a pathway for attendees to later apply for Junior Counselors when on-campus camps will resume.

There will be a need for many local volunteers to help with breakout rooms both in morning and afternoon classes and later for evening programs. Organizational and coaching skills (not necessarily science-oriented) are desired. Training for volunteers in all areas will be provided. I will be your fearless leader.

Camp cost would be about \$400/camper, and likely 2020 TT girls will be able to attend. Money

deposited for 2020 can be applied to this Virtual camp.

This 2021 camp has a budget for technology to assist girls. Qualcomm is researching changing the robotics program to accommodate Chromebook laptops as all other classes can be given on Chromebooks and all North Tahoe students have them. The amount of screen time is a concern but not all girls will need to use their screens, perhaps just audio. They must confirm attendance if not on screen.

There are many opportunities to volunteer from your own house with more information to follow. It is an ambitious program, and Dr. Mimi seems like the one to pull it together based on her successful program last summer.

I hope you will join me in <u>being open to the</u> <u>possibilities</u> this virtual camp may offer our local girls, and our branch.

The nominating process for camp will begin in January 2021.
