Wow! I hope that if you didn't get a chance to watch the mesmerizing inaugural poem performed by its young author, that you'll watch it <u>online</u>. Feeling lighter myself after Wednesday.

And what an historic day it was! The shattering of glass in the Capitol on January 6 failed to keep the glass ceiling intact, as we now have a **female Vice President!** As those who attended our Holiday Zoom-fest may recall, the United States scored only 17 on a scale of 100 (where the lower the score, the worse the performance in terms of female participation in governmental leadership positions). Out of 193 countries, we rank 128 because of our <u>low female participation score</u>. But as **VP Kamala Harris** said, she may be the first, but she won't be the last.

Harris is California-grown, having served as the San Francisco District Attorney from 2003 - 2011, the California Attorney General from 2011-2017, and as our junior Senator from 2017 to her promotion this month to Vice President. California in many ways is a laboratory for policy change, a huge asset that Harris will bring to her new position.

California has already approved and implemented many of the goals of the Biden/Harris administration, such as <u>curbing greenhouse gas emissions</u>, <u>raising the minimum wage to \$15</u> an hour, and giving workers <u>paid family leave</u> to name a few. Given Harris 'career as a prosecutor and her leadership position in California's climate policies, she might well be tasked with helming **criminal justice reform** and/or **environmental protection**, two of the very huge upcoming legislative and regulatory lifts.

And AAUW's work on the gender pay cap will have renewed energy. While many of us have our work histories in our rear-view mirrors, the pandemic has been a disproportionate economic hit for women, particularly women of color, which will have economic ramifications for years, compounding the inequities of the existing gender wage gap. The challenges of caretakingexacerbated by virtual schooling, closed daycare centers and isolated seniors—have taken a significant toll on the work life of many women. Time out of the workforce affects lifetime earnings, and many employers still erroneously rely on previous wages to set salaries, a practice outlawed by California Labor Code section 432.3, implemented in 2018.

Good news: On January 16, AAUW-CA Board agreed to allow girls selected for the 2020 Tech Trek camp to attend the 2021 TT Virtual Robotics camp. Thank you, AAUW-CA board members! I emailed North Tahoe School staff to ask for their participation and received an enthusiastic reply from the Principal and two 7th grade teachers. They were happy to hear that last year's girls are also permitted to attend. I asked them to be on the lookout for simplified, online nomination forms in a couple of weeks for this year's girls.

More exciting news from AAUW-CA: On January 17, the AAUW-CA Board of Directors formed the **Tech Trek of the Future task force** to chart a course to make Tech Trek the <u>premier STEM</u> camp in California.

Over the next four to six months, using input from many stakeholders, the group will create a preliminary strategic plan that identifies at least four top priority areas of focus. Stakeholders will include: AAUW-CA Tech Trek Co-Coordinators, Camp staff representing their peer groups, Directors with varied experience, Camp Treasurer, Tech Trek Founder Marie Wolbach, and AAUW National STEM coordinator.

Branch Tech Trek Coordinators/Treasurers will have an opportunity to provide feedback via focus groups, which will be explained further in upcoming communications.

With respect to the <u>2021 Virtual Tech Trek</u> <u>Camp</u>, TT coordinators from around the State met on January 21st via Zoom with Virtual chair Dr. Mary Isaac (Dr. Mimi), to hear about camper nomination and selection processes. Camp cost will be \$400/camper. Money deposited for 2020 can be applied to this Virtual camp.

Importantly, <u>branches must return the signed</u>
<u>MOU promptly</u> when the link is sent to branch
TT coordinators around January 25, 2021. The
MOU requires the signature of a president and
the coordinator, with a "best guess" on number
of girls (2020 & 2021), that the branch will send
to the Virtual Camp.

One slight addition to curricula will adjust for 7th vs. 8th grade girls. The camp coordinators and Dr. Mimi believe that skill levels do not vary much with the grade levels, and that by being virtual, the social differences won't be noticeable. The Virtual TT camp will help with laptops or Internet access if needed. Camps are scheduled for June 21-25, July 12-16, and July 26-30. https://www.aauw-ca.org/2021-virtual-tech-trek-internal/

As you read last month, Dr. Mimi hosted a similar virtual camp last summer. Several of the girls who attended that camp want to join this year's Virtual camp too. She does not recommend that they do. Remember, the Virtual 2021 camp would provide a pathway for attendees to apply for Junior Counselors when on-campus camps resume.

I asked our 2016 Trekkers if they were interested in being a peer counselor or coach, with a stipend. No replies yet. I will also reach out to our other former Trekkers.

Science skills are not required for all volunteers, young or old, rather, organizational and coaching skills. All volunteers will receive online training as much as needed, in all areas. Please consider the possibility. I will be your fearless leader!

Members of our branch have stepped up to volunteer for the 2021 TT interview team, which will be online. The team is Cheryl Allen, Kathie Julian, Christine Madden and Meri McEneny. Thank you, team!
