<u>America.</u> People desperately want to be heard. They want to be listened to and understood.

- 2. <u>Kindness is time</u>. Show up for people. Do good deeds.
- 3. <u>Life is a trust fall and asking for help is</u> **OK.**
- 4. The only antidote to hurting is helping.
- **5.** My mom was right. You cannot be a passive bystander waiting for 'good' to reveal itself. Because good things are rarely passive, they're about being proactive. It's about seeing an opportunity and actually doing something.

The news is often filled with what is not working, including dire predictions for our future, especially for the health of our home the planet Earth and the state of our democracy. What can we each do to help create a better and healthier tomorrow? What can we each do to further our AAUW Mission of advancing gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy?

March 10 at 1:00 pm via Zoom - *Erin Holland* from North Tahoe Fire Protection District will fill us in on our local forest fire situation.


Saturday April 30 (9:30 – 1:00, Zoom webinar) Members are encouraged to attend the virtual AAUW California Annual Meeting.

On Thursday, February 10, 2022, AAUW North Tahoe held their General Membership zoom meeting.

We were delighted to hear from our 2021-2022 Scholarship recipient, Mariana Bravo Corona. She is a very accomplished young woman who excelled in all her coursework at North Tahoe High School, including several Advanced Placement STEM courses. She maintained a G.P.A. of 4.2 at North Tahoe. Kathie and I were both very impressed with all aspects of her application. She was a consistent Distinguished Scholar and a Student of the Month as well! She is a first generation to attend college in her family. An older sister has already graduated, and her brother will be in college at the same time Mariana will be.

Mariana is attending <u>Loyola Marymount</u> <u>University</u> located in Los Angeles on the west side of the city near Playa Vista. This is a private Jesuit university with small classes and close ties with professors. As a freshman, she is following coursework that introduces various engineering fields to the freshman in engineering. She

expressed an interest in <u>Civil Engineering</u> to our group. Mariana gave us a brief summary of her campus life and answered several questions from our members. She appears to be very happy with her choice, and we wish her well with her studies!

Nomination forms for Tech Trek 2022 arrived from AAUW-CA and were sent to our 4 participating teachers at North Tahoe School. Thank you, teachers!

Interestingly, even though we have a committed and expanded interview team for Tech Trek applicants, AAUW National does not require, nor encourage, interviews. Rather, they recommend relying on teacher nominations and their rankings, and the student applications. Something to consider going forward to simplify the Tech Trek selection process.

This week we will confirm and submit the MOU with AAUW-CA to initiate our relationship with Tech Trek 2022 and allow nominations to be submitted by our teachers. My recommendation to send 2 girls to Virtual camp has required a slight modification of the MOU which should be forthcoming. AAUW-CA TT Director Karen M., agreed with our intent to have both in-person and virtual campers, but this requires changing the "electronic box" we check on the MOU.

Teachers were asked to nominate 10-12, 7th grade girls, for our <u>5 in-person campers</u>, and possibly <u>2 more Virtual campers</u>. Once the teachers submit the nominees, the system automatically sends out applications to the girls and sends information to their parents. After

years of having piles of paperwork, now there is none!

The cost for Virtual camp is about half the cost of in-person, and the VTT camp was an amazing experience. I encourage our branch to add 2 girls this year for VTT, while the opportunity to send more girls to this type of STEM experience is available.

Branch coordinators keep track of all student and volunteer forms by logging into our branch folder at the UC Davis TT camp website. Lots of good changes in two years.

The website also tracks and responds to volunteer forms for Dorm Moms, Junior Counselors, and Virtual coaches. Three former campers have applied to the JC program, plus our former Truckee-Donner branch camper, Marion, now attending North Tahoe, who will help with our interviews. AAUW- CA suggested adding a former camper to the interview team, if we choose to have interviews.

We are requesting <u>Saturday June 4, 9-12 noon</u>, for our <u>STEM Trek Day</u> at TERC in Incline Village. Once again, four local branches will team up to invite all interested girls and members to this dynamic day. More info to follow once we receive a date confirmation!

Our InStitches group decided to share this productivity with local people who may need

warm, soft coverings. We identified <u>STEPP</u> to receive caps, mittens, and other items stitched with love by our members. Sierra Teen Education Parenting Program, located on the <u>Sierra High School</u> campus in <u>Truckee</u>, "is primarily in place for teen[-parents] who are still in high school. We have the parents during the day working on parenting and life skills. If our program is not full with teens, we also have a transitional aspect that enrolls income-qualifying families and parents who have graduated."

If you have an interest in participating, Stitchers will share yarns, materials, and instructions for items to donate. No previous experience required. For example, if you know how to tie a knot, you can make a no-sew fleece blanket. We intend to stitch "AAUW North Tahoe" labels into the items to remind local families of our community service mission.
