STEM Trek Day (STD) was a multi-branch success in June 2022. Participants numbered 20 but they came from 4 branches: North Tahoe, Truckee-Donner, South Lake, and Tahoe Nevada.

The 3 presenters included a former TT camper from South Lake and the long-awaited presentation by aviator/mathematician/life-long learner, <u>Anna Serbinenko</u>, who is using the pandemic to pursue another Ph.D. in the logistics of payload transport for space exploration. Anna met some girls and Meri at the Truckee Air Show in July.

The Night Watchman is:

- Winner of the 2021 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction
- New York Times Best Seller
- Washington Post, Amazon, NPR, CBS Sunday Morning, Kirkus, Chicago Public Library, and Good Housekeeping Best Book of 2020

Based on the extraordinary life of National Book Award-winning author Louise Erdrich's grandfather who worked as a night watchman and carried the fight against Native dispossession from rural North Dakota all the way to Washington, DC, this powerful novel explores themes of love and death with lightness and gravity and unfolds with the elegant prose, sly humor, and depth of feeling of a master craftsman.
