



#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In mid-September, my husband and I flew back to Massachusetts to attend his 50th high school reunion and visit

with some of his family members that still live in the state. The reunion included a delicious dinner, and it was heartwarming for me to see my husband with his childhood friends and listen to their reminisces of the early 1970s and stories of where they are now 50 years on.

One day, we walked the <u>Freedom Trail</u> around <u>Boston</u>, which traces key events that led up to the Revolutionary War and the adoption of the Declaration of Independence, which contains the bold statement in its Preamble that "*We hold these truths to be self-evident, that ALL MEN are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness.*"

I am writing this message on the second day of Fall 2022, and we are now in central New York state, visiting the Finger Lakes Area. Yesterday, we toured the <u>Women's Rights National Historical Park</u> in <u>Seneca Falls</u>, which commemorates the **First Women's Rights Convention** that took place on July 19 and 20, **1848** and was convened by a visionary group of women, mostly Quakers, to discuss the social, civil, and religious condition and rights of women. Out of this conference came the <u>Declaration of Sentiments</u>, which includes the even bolder statement that "We hold these truths to be selfevident, that **ALL MEN AND WOMEN** are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness."



One hundred people, including 68 women and 32 men, out of 300 attendees signed the Declaration of Sentiments. One-third of the people present, less than a majority -- and the husband of one woman who signed made her remove her signature. The women and men who signed this Declaration were courageous and able to envision new ways of seeing the relationships within our society.



As my husband and I toured the sites in Seneca Falls and read about the state of women's lives in the 1840s, it was a sobering reminder of how constricted they were -- women had no voice in public and their personal lives were legally controlled by their husbands. Quaker women opened the door a crack when they were allowed to speak at prayer meetings, a practice condemned by most at the time. Conditions changed in fits and starts, one step forward and two steps back sometimes.

When my husband graduated from high school in 1972, most American newspapers had Help Wanted Ads separated into For Women and For Men. Today, in some countries, conditions are abysmal for women; I just read a news article about a 22-year-old Iranian woman who died in police custody after not following the hijab laws.

Do you feel challenged by some of the proposed social, legal, and religious changes that are put forth today? Take a long look and ask yourself if you may be in a space of accepting the way things have always been and not seeing the possibilities of what could be. I am grateful to belong to AAUW, which continues to broaden its scope and champion equity for all.
