Please VOTE in the upcoming **November 8**th **election**, and before voting, read reputable sources regarding the candidates and California Propositions or Nevada Questions on your ballots, and reflect on which choices will further our AAUW Mission and support our democracy. Foundational to a functioning and healthy democracy is the rule of law, and who we elect determines what those laws will be and whether or not they will be upheld and enforced equitably throughout our nation.

I recently received a newsletter from the John F. Kennedy Library Foundation in Massachusetts, and it included a bookmark with the following quote from one of Kennedy's speeches: "For one true measure of a nation is its success in fulfilling the promise of a better life for each of its members. Let this be the measure of our nation."

What helps individuals and nations fulfill their potential? A thriving democracy provides justice, prosperity, and security, which allow individuals to

have access to opportunity and a peaceful environment in which to pursue it.

Slave Cabins to the White House: Homemade
Citizenship in African American Culture" is written by
AAUW Fund Fellow Koritha Mitchell.

Koritha Mitchell analyzes canonical texts by and about African American women to lay bare the hostility these women face as they invest in traditional domesticity. Instead of the respectability and safety granted white homemakers, black women endure pejorative labels, racist governmental policies, attacks on their citizenship, and aggression meant to keep them in "their place."

Powerful and provocative, From Slave Cabins to the White House illuminates the links between African American women's homemaking and citizenship in history and across literature.

This five-star-rated book is available on Kindle, in hard back and paperback, on Amazon, and hopefully, at your local library. Jo Ann Cobb ordered her copy directly from the University of Chicago.
