Happy New Year, North Tahoe members!

2023 is the 25th Anniversary of Tech Trek

Let's renew our engagement with this fun and empowering program!

The Tech Trek Memorandum of Understanding from AAUW-CA arrived and has been submitted by our president Jo Ann. This begins the process for our participation in Tech Trek 2023. By signing the MOU, we agree to these policies:

- Commit to fund the number of camperships our branch has requested. (Our final branch allocation will be determined at the state level and may be different from our original request).
- Designate a branch coordinator to be the point of contact and be responsible for decisions regarding final assignment of campers to camp.

We requested 5 camper spots, and have monies held by AAUW-CA Special Projects Funds to pay for these spots. Meri will continue as branch coordinator.

We can now request nominations from North Tahoe School 7th grade teachers in early January 2023. The nomination forms are the same as the teachers used these last few years. Two of our teachers, and principal Lindeen confirmed their continued involvement (and enthusiasm!) this past October.

In January, the number of branch reservations will be confirmed by the individual camps, i.e., UC Davis Tech Trek. If that number is less than we requested, we will be given the opportunity to reassign the balance to virtual camp. We are expected to confirm or modify our camp reservations by March 1, 2023.

New this year is the <u>CampDoc</u> platform for TT camper registration and tracking. This platform will aid Camp Directors and branch coordinators in reviewing and updating all camper information more easily than before. CampDoc will be live January 25. CampDoc is the leading Electronic Health Record system for camps and youth programs: www.campdoc.com.

As the newest member of the TT-CA committee, Meri is learning first-hand the workings of the program, and the great women who volunteer for the program from State and the branches. AAUW-CA is actively working to find new camps and expand existing camps at Sonoma, UCD, Fresno or elsewhere in the north state.

Recruiting more volunteers is critical for maintaining or expanding camps.

SCHOLARSHIP

The Tahoe Truckee Scholarship Committee (TTSC) shared this information with us, and we thought members of North Lake Tahoe AAUW would be interested in it as well.

In 2022, there were 231 scholarships awarded for a total of \$1.35 million. Of the 121 recipients, 50 were the 1st generation in their families to attend college. Our STEM Scholarship recipient for 2022, **Katherine Le**, is a first-generation college attendee in her family. Our one-year scholarship to her was for \$2,000. The TTSC awarded her an additional \$10,000.

Katherine Le's parents own the Unique Nail Salon in Tahoe City. Ellen has watched Katherine grow-up from 2nd grade and was delighted to see what an accomplished scholar she was at North Tahoe High School. She is attending Cal Poly at San Luis Obispo majoring in Biology. Patricia Watters, our Finance officer, has taken her out to lunch, and relays that Katherine is really enjoying her college experience. We appreciate Patricia's effort to support our scholarship recipient! We hope Katherine will be able to attend one of our meetings if she's home and available to do so.

Elections Finally Over - How'd We Do in '22?

The election is finally over! In addition to an end to the non-stop requests for donations, AAUW members can be pretty happy with the results. Here are a few highlights:

- 1 woman each was added to the U.S. House and the U.S. Senate, bringing the numbers to 124 (H) and 25 (S)
- Of the total of 149, 54 are women of color
- We lost the most powerful woman in government (Nancy Pelosi) but still have a woman on the Minority leadership team, Minority Whip Katherine Clark
- Governors of 12 states are now women
- 23% of all mayors across the nation are women, including our brand new and **first** female mayor of Los Angeles, Karen Bass
- 20 women won new seats in the California Legislature and 30 female incumbents were re-elected, bringing the total to 50 but still just 42%
- All executive positions in California except Governor are filled by women, including Secretary of State, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, and Controller, as well as the Senate Pro Tem
- Proposition 1 prevailed and women's right to control their own reproductive choices is now enshrined in our constitution.

And here are some fun facts:

- Only 3.2% of all members of Congress to date have been women
- California has sent more women to Congress than any other state a total of 47 to date
- Vermont is the only state that has never sent a woman to either the House or the Senate
