I know that many of us are feeling helpless right now, seeing what's happening in Washington DC. Project 2025 seems to fly in the face of our AAUW mission. But there are things we can do. Please take another look at the email that we all received on Feb. 10th from AAUW CA with the subject "Take Action to Fight Project 2025." I think talking to our friends and neighbors about our concerns is so important! We can't ignore the threats to our democracy.

There's an organization starting up called Placer County Public School Defenders Hub Coalition. This is a local effort to engage our communities and inform people about the dangers to our public schools. Several Placer County public school boards have been taken over by conservative members with threats of school vouchers, dismantling equity efforts, and reducing the safety of our most marginalized students. My special concern is the effort to change how history is taught. If we don't face the difficulties of our past, we'll never get beyond them. I've requested more information about this Hub Coalition to see what we can do. I look

forward to our **General Meeting on March 13th**, where we'll hear from our local school superintendent.

Also, please send in your nominees for the AAUW Fund award by March 10th (see Jan's article in the last issue). This is important, and we need member input. Thank you!


# **BOOK GROUP**

Dr. Faith Mitchell the author of *Emma's Postcard Album* joined

Her fascinating presentation and our discsussion about the postcards in the book opened our eyes about what it was like to be a young free Black woman living during Jim Crow.

The March meeting of the Book Group will be on **Tuesday, March 25th at the Tahoe Yacht Club from 12:00 to 2:00 pm**. Barbara Ramsey will lead the discussion on *This House of Sky*, a memoir by

Ivan Doig, published in 1978. Ivan Doig was an acclaimed American author and novelist, celebrated for his vivid portrayals of life in the American West, particularly his native Montana. This book is a poignant and deeply personal account of Doig's early life growing up in western Montana among the sheepherders and denizens of small-town saloons and valley ranches. It details his experiences growing up in the rugged landscapes of the American West and explores themes of family, loss, and resilience.

This House of Sky received widespread acclaim for its lyrical prose and heartfelt storytelling. It was a finalist for the National Book Award and remains one of Doig's most beloved works. It is available in paperback, Kindle, and audible formats.

As usual, this will be a hybrid meeting – if you can't attend in person, you can join us remotely via Zoom. We will send a Zoom link in advance for anyone who would prefer to join the discussion from home.
