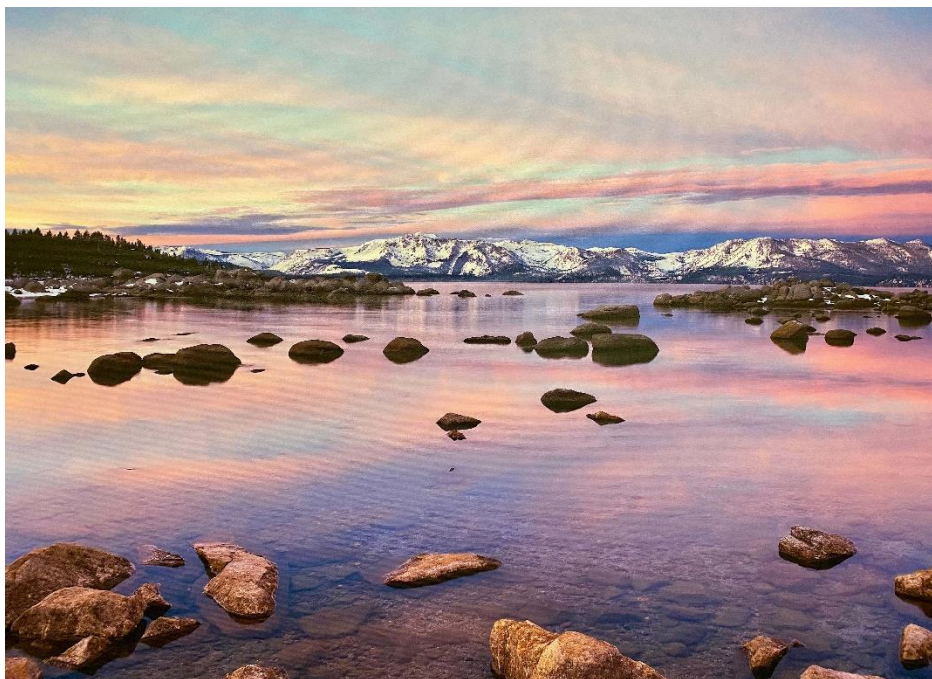

Tech Trek

It has been a great start to the year for our Tech Trek (TT) program!



We invited Tech Trek girls from 2022-2025 and their families to the Tahoe Environmental Research Center (TERC) talk at Sunnyside. Dr. Andrea Schreier, Professor at UC Davis, presented on DNA Detectives: Using DNA in the Environment to Study Fish and Wildlife.

Everyone was reminded that attending the presentation qualifies as being an Ambassador for Tech Trek. As a result, two TT girls and their moms were in attendance!



As soon as school resumed after the holidays, Zulema B. contacted me about giving her presentation on Tech Trek UCD camp 2025 (postponed from Oct. due to illness, then she was stage manager for a play, then holidays!) We met at the North Tahoe School (NTS) library for her presentation during her lunch period. Zulema invited her classmate and TT campmate Audrey A, who agreed to introduce Zulema for her presentation. (Audrey has volunteered to be the emcee for TT presentations next October).

I felt that the most remarkable part of her talk was her reference to getting to know her NTS classmates better at TT, not just the new girls she met. She had this on her poster as well, which was nicely done. She also brought her solar car from her Core Class Climate Engineering for a show & tell during her presentation.



Mid-January I was contacted by Julia Anderson, 7th grade Science teacher, to meet the 10 new 7th grade nominees for Tech Trek 2026 on a school day during lunch in Mrs. Anderson's Science class. Mrs. Julia Anderson is an amazing teacher and supporter of Tech Trek! The real gems of the 30-minute lunchtime meeting were last year's TT campers Abby, Zulema, Gaby, and Audrey, who were invited by Mrs. Anderson to tell the nominees about TT camp. They did so honestly and appreciatively, each encouraging the new girls to apply, each one saying camp is full of great experiences, more friendly than they feared, and opened their eyes to many new possibilities during lunch.

The CampDoc platform for registration opens at the end of January for parents to begin the process of their daughters applying for camp; then the interview team will read the applications and essays, with interviews early March. Eligible TT alums can also register to apply for up to two residential camps plus virtual camp. All the parents and alums will be contacted when CampDoc opens to encourage their registration.



Lisa Abrahams with the AAUW Truckee branch was contacted regarding their TT program. Lisa reported that the Truckee branch has funding for this year and will send girls this summer (2026). Their program will then close when the branch closes. A conversation took place with AAUW NT member, Jenny Moon about serving Truckee girls and how that might continue with our branch. Our NT members who reside in Truckee will lead efforts for funding and working with the Alder Creek MS.

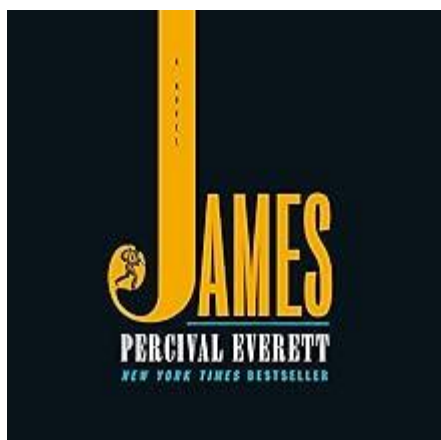
Interest Groups

Book Group



The next meeting of the Book Group will be on Tuesday, February 24th at the Tahoe City Yacht Club from 12:00 to 2:00 PM. Cheryl Allen will lead the discussion on "*James: A Novel*" by Percival Everett. A Pulitzer Prize Winner, #1 *New York Times* Bestseller, and National Book Award Winner, this book is an action-packed reimagining of *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* told from the enslaved Jim's point of view. I suggest that you quickly review Mark Twain's original book in preparation for reading this version if the story.

This novel retells the events through the eyes of Jim, revealing him not as the caricature imposed by white society but as a literate, perceptive, and morally grounded man navigating the brutality of enslavement. The story follows Jim as he flees after learning he will be sold away from his family, joins Huck on the river, and uses both intellect and survival strategies—such as code-switching into "slave talk"—to protect himself and those he loves. Everett emphasizes Jim's inner life, his longing for freedom, and his sharp critique of the racist structures around him, transforming a familiar American classic into a powerful exploration of agency, humanity, and resistance.

The book is available on Audio, Kindle, and Hardcover versions.

This will be a hybrid meeting - if you cannot attend in person, you can join us remotely via Zoom. We will send a Zoom link for anyone who would prefer to join the discussion from home.
